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

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Introduction


The Town of Danville's historic downtown, the heart of the community, is a product of three decades of careful planning. The original Downtown Master Plan (adopted in 1986) in conjunction with a number of subsequent policy documents, have guided downtown's commercial growth, circulation pattern, infrastructure development, and land use controls to reinforce its pedestrian scale. Cumulatively, these guiding documents and companion implementation actions have been able to accommodate commercial growth, respond to evolving community needs, all while retaining the *feel* of Danville's uniqueness through showcasing its historic roots.

The intent of the *Danville 2022 Downtown Master Plan Update* (DMP Update) is to carry this vision into the future while adapting to changing community needs brought about by the onset of the global Covid-19 pandemic. Specifically, it introduces new placemaking strategies that respond to the highest priority needs - expressed through a vast

community survey and focused workshops – which include a desire for:


- More community gathering spaces, with enhanced ambiance
- Stronger connections to and through the downtown
- Improvements that enhance pedestrian safety, primarily through reducing vehicle speeds
- Opportunities to play, recreate, celebrate, and appreciate art and culture

Consequently, the DMP Update focuses on an **updated set of implementation actions** that enhances the use of the public realm within the Old Town District rather than a wholesale revision of the current goals and policies.

Downtown Vision

INCREASE PUBLIC GATHERING SPACE

How and where can we capture additional space for public use and programming?

- Extend curbs to create more pedestrian space
- · Create a pedestrian scaled Town Plaza
- Provide additional public seating opportunities throughout Downtown
- Incorporate public gathering in new development throughout Downtown
- Encourage joint use of public/private space

- Replace or enhance the overhead banner at the southern terminus of Hartz Avenue
- Provide new directional signage at trail connections
- Consider seasonal or event-specific light-pole banners
- Consider adding gateway monumentation signage

ACTIVATE UNDERUTILIZED SPACES

How can we make use of "blank" spaces to add interest and promote continuity along Downtown streets?

- Consider a temporary storefront art program
- Allow pop-ups on vacant sites
- Encourage private development to provide public gathering space








Many public realm improvements have been made since the creation of the last Downtown Master Plan and Streetscape Beautification Plan. Building upon the great work already completed, the following projects have been identified and organized into primary and secondary implementation projects.

PRIMARY IMPLEMENTATION PROJECTS

A series of primary implementation projects have been identified that focus on the core of the Old Town District, focusing in and around Hartz Avenue as well as the connections to the Village Theatre, Town Green and San Ramon Creek.







Hartz Avenue Sidewalk Expansion


The Hartz Avenue Sidewalk Expansion provides a wider sidewalk within the core area of the Old Town District, between Linda Mesa Avenue on the north and Prospect Avenue to the south. This area of Hartz Avenue is composed primarily of one- and two-story older commercial-style buildings with no front or side yard setbacks. The existing narrow sidewalks provide space for pedestrian circulation but are not adequate for outdoor dining or gathering spaces. These programs are now accommodated within a permanent expansion of the sidewalks. Additionally, this project area includes two raised intersections, one at Hartz Avenue and Linda Mesa Avenue and another at Hartz Avenue and Prospect Avenue.






Church Street Plaza


Church Street, running east-west across Hartz Avenue, is the focal point connecting the Village Theatre and Arts District across the Old Town District to Railroad Avenue and the Iron Horse Trail beyond. An expanded sidewalk space provides additional permanent area for dining and public gathering. In particular, the expanded sidewalk on the northern part of the western side of Church Street integrates the existing tree planting areas into the sidewalk. A raised intersection is provided at the intersection of Church Street and Hartz Avenue. Retractable bollards are located at intersection points along Church Street so that portions of the street can be closed off for special events, creating a pedestrian plaza.







Theatre Plaza

The Theatre Plaza is located adjacent to the Village Theatre and creates a connection from the Church Street Plaza to Front Street and the future San Ramon Creek Trail. The Theatre Plaza improves an existing parking area to provide a flexible space that allows for parking on a regular basis and a multi-purpose event space on a temporary basis. Retractable bollards at either end of the plaza can close the area to vehicular traffic.




Town Green Improvements


Town Green improvements have been envisioned as part of the Arts District Concept Master Plan. This project incorporates those improvements into the Downtown Master Plan and extends them to the creek edge, adding an overlook area to the existing Creek Trail. The overlook provides views to San Ramon Creek and connects the Town Green directly to the Creek.

Town Green and Arts District Concept Master Plan (2019)













Creek Trail Extension

San Ramon Creek is an underutilized part of the Old Town District. The Creek Trail Extension creates a new connection to the creek, integrating it into the fabric of the Town. The trail extension builds upon the existing creek trail along the Town Green, extending the trail north past Diablo Road and connecting back to Hartz Avenue. The






Prospect Avenue Public Space


Prospect Avenue has a small scale intimate character. The Prospect Avenue Public Space builds upon this character and improves the pedestrian circulation on the northern side of the street. The existing edge on the northern side of the street has a narrow sidewalk and lacks any street trees. A sidewalk expansion on the northern edge will provide better pedestrian circulation, space for outdoor dining or public gathering, and areas for street trees.








Downtown Danville Monumentation

Downtown Danville Monumentation is proposed for each of the three primary gateways into the Old Town District - at the northern and southern intersections between Hartz Avenue and Railroad Avenue and at Diablo Road where it crosses San Ramon Creek. The existing banner along Hartz Avenue towards the southern edge of the Old Town District should be improved to provide a more permanent gateway with easier maintenance. Other gateway locations should be marked with vertical elements or pylons to form thresholds into the Old Town District.











Intersections and Specialty Lighting

This implementation option focuses improvements on the intersections along the core area of Hartz Avenue. While some of these intersection improvements are included in other projects, they could also occur independently to focus implementation on highly visible areas that have the greatest impact. The intersections are natural areas to create additional public space. Sidewalk expansions not only create more space to sit, dine and gather, but also make street crossings safer and more pedestrian friendly. Raised intersections are proposed along Hartz Avenue at Linda Mesa Avenue and Prospect Avenue. Intersections at Church Street and School Street will receive a decorative treatment. Diablo Road will receive a specialty paving inlay to mark it as a primary intersection.

Primary Implementation Matrix

SECONDARY IMPLEMENTATION PROJECTS

A series of secondary implementation projects have been identified that reinforce the edges and connections to the Old Town District as well as improvements throughout the broader Downtown area.

Maker Space Development

The Maker Space Development includes the redevelopment of two parcels along the San Ramon Creek that have been acquired by the Town. The sites should be evaluated for how existing structures can be reused, what additional programming can be added to the site, how new public spaces can be integrated with the development including a connection to the future creek trail, and any new infrastructure needed to support the development.

Iron Horse Trail Access Point Enhancement

Iron Horse Trail Access Point Enhancements include additional signage and improvements to physical connection points that encourage better access to the Old Town District from the trail.

Love Lane Sidewalk Expansion

Love Lane Sidewalk Expansion includes creating a missing sidewalk segment to provide safe pedestrian access to the Iron Horse Trail along Love Lane.

North Hartz Area Improvement

The North Hartz Area Improvement should include a study of land use, zoning, and public realm improvements that encourages the development of a pedestrian friendly built environment.

Museum Plaza

Museum Plaza includes the expansion of the existing plaza adjacent to Museum of the San Ramon Valley in order to provide more space for public gathering and special events.

Downtown Business Improvement District

The creation of a Downtown Business Improvement District (BID) would enable a higher level of maintenance, security, marketing, promotion, programming, amenities, and funding for Downtown businesses.



Creekside Trail (Future Phases)

The full completion of a creekside trail relies upon property easements and infrastructural challenges that may become possible in the future. As these constraints are resolved, phases of the creekside trail should be implemented to create a continuous connection from Hartz Way on the south to the intersection of Hartz Avenue and Railroad Avenue to the north.

Other Projects

While the primary and secondary implementation projects focus on the Old Town District, potential projects were identified in the larger Downtown Area, most notable beautification of San Ramon Valley Boulevard from Hartz Way to Sycamore Valley Road. Future studies should build upon the work being done in the Old Town District to provide implementation projects throughout Downtown Danville.







Public Space Palette


Danville's Old Town District is a valuable resource for the entire community and is given special design attention within this public space palette. The Old Town District includes the area south of the Hartz Avenue / Railroad Avenue intersection, north of the Railroad Avenue / Hartz Way intersection, east of the Iron Horse Trail and west of Front Street.

The area is already an important community center for retail and office activities and its historic character offers a focus for civic pride. While Danville continues to evolve, the many historic buildings interwoven within the Old Town District are a reminder of Danville's early days. The small scale and density of Hartz Avenue and Prospect Avenue offer a perfect opportunity for a bustling pedestrian shopping and working environment.

The purpose of the Public Space Palette is to provide unifying design elements that weave together the unique architectural features of the Old Town District.

The Public Space Palette will guide changes in the streetscape to be implemented by the Town and/or private property owners. The elements used to improve the streetscape are primarily street furnishings, pedestrian lighting, sidewalk paving and street trees.





STREET FURNISHINGS

Street furnishings encourage users to stay longer and explore Danville's unique offerings. A street furnishings palette has been selected to provide a refined and sophisticated palette that compliments Danville's character. The selection includes a standard palette and encourages specialty furnishings to be chosen per project to be used at more prominent or specific locations. The standard street furnishings palette includes a bench and trash receptacle.

Specialty furnishings may focus on sculptural bench options that can provide custom seating configurations, playful arrangements and visual interest to encourage users of all ages to interact with Danville's streetscapes in new ways. Standard furnishings should be used along typical sidewalk conditions or where more prominent furnishings are not needed. Specialy furnishings should be used at prominent locations where there is more gathering space which may include intersections, plazas, or curb extensions.



PEDESTRIAN LIGHTING

Pedestrian lighting provides streetscape ambiance and compliments street lights geared towards vehicular areas. Pedestrian lighting creates a welcoming atmosphere, a unique environment and can increase the safety of the streetscape. Two typologies of pedestrian lighting will define the Old Town District. String lights will run parallel along the sidewalks of east-west streets including Linda Mesa Avenue, Prospect Avenue and Church Street as well

as criss-cross over a new pedestrian plaza by the Theatre. Specialty lighting will be located at key nodes along Hartz Avenue and Front Street to highlight intersections or key pedestrian connections.











SIDEWALK PAVING


Sidewalk paving varies within the Old Town District. Building upon the existing paving character, revised paving types provide updated materials, tree pit conditions, and accommodate expanded sidewalk areas. Each type generally includes a paved parking strip, concrete sidewalk and tree grates within enlarged tree pits.





STREET TREES

Street trees provide a distinctive character in the Old Town District. They provide shade and contribute to the overall ambiance. The following street tree palette builds upon existing trees found in the Old Town District. This palette provides revised tree species that continue the character of the existing tree canopy, updates species according to common availability, and selects species that are resistant to prevalent natural diseases.




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Most Preferred Types of Public Spaces


Most Preferred Outdoor Programs

Most Preferred Street Elements


