


Strategy Survey Results

Purpose & Content

- Online survey developed to gauge Salem community members' priorities for implementing potential climate action strategies.
- Objective was to identify which ideas should be included, which should not
- Total of 211 ideas across 7 Action Areas
- Sourced from Task Force members, community participants and subject matter experts

Ranking & Response

- Asked for qualitative feedback using a ranking scale
- Strategies with high GHG impact in bold
- Respondents could also leave open-ended comments
- Task Force survey: March 8 21
 - 30 responses
- Community survey: March 12 28
 - 186 responses
- Same content in each



Results

- Task Force members rated strategies much more positively than community members
 - On 96 ideas, 75% or higher of the rankings were "Yes"
 - On the Community responses, only 7 ideas received 75% or higher "Yes" ranking

Top 10 Results - Most Popular Ideas

Task Force Preferences

- 1. Bus service
- Sidewalks
- 3. EVs
- 4. Walking paths to bus stops
- 5. Communicate climate risks
- 6. City trees
- 7. Improve energy efficiency in municipal buildings
- 8. Improve energy efficiency in municipal buildings (similar strategy as #7)
- 9. Small houses & ADUs
- 10. Engage residents on climate risks
- 11. Align with OGWC findings/reports

Community Preferences

- 1. Repair sidewalks
- 2. Preserve green spaces
- 3. City trees
- 4. Native plantings
- 5. Parks
- 6. Small-scale food producers
- 7. Invasive species
- 8. Community gardens
- 9. Collect hard-to-recycle items
- 10. Expand transit

Bottom 10 Results - Least Popular Ideas

Task Force Preferences

- 1. Prohibit service to Salem airport
- 2. Congestion pricing
- Divert C&D waste
- 4. Eliminate parking minimums
- Send waste to landfill rather than Covanta
- 6. Differential utility rates
- 250' development buffer near waterways
- 8. Move Front St. bypass underground
- 9. Tax impervious surfaces
- Downtown circulator

Community Preferences

- 1. Prohibit service to Salem airport
- 2. Congestion pricing
- 3. Prohibit new natural gas hookups
- 4. Increase hydrogen in natural gas system
- 5. Trip reduction ordinance for employers
- 6. Prohibit widening roads
- 7. Eliminate parking minimums
- 8. Reach building code
- 9. Charge for parking
- 10. Bikeshare program

Comments from Task Force Members

- Concern about which strategies will actually reduce GHG emissions
- Balance with livability and equity
- City vs. Cherriots responsibility
- City vs. utilities responsibility
- Tension between reducing car travel and need for parking in a developing downtown
- Not much interest in educational campaigns
- EV transition is important, but it should be done thoughtfully

Comments from Task Force Members

- Support for increasing density, but different ideas for how it should be done
- Concern about divisive impact of taxes and/or bans
- Support for more diverse and equitable decision-making
- Very low support for cultivating arts/culture
- Feeling that housing affordability is not related to climate resilience

Strategies with Diverse Opinions

Research the feasibility of a gas tax

- Task Force: 59% Yes, 23% Unsure, 18% No
- Community: 39% Yes, 13% Unsure, 48% No

Charge for parking in high-use areas

- Task Force: 73% Yes, 9% Unsure, 18% No
- Community: 33% Yes, 17% Unsure, 50% No

Implement a trip reduction ordinance for Salem employers over 100 people

- Task Force: 45% Yes, 30% Unsure, 22% No
- Community: 22% Yes, 30% Unsure, 47% No

No new natural gas hookups

- Task Force: 44% Yes, 39% Unsure, 17% No
- Community: 22% Yes, 16% Unsure, 62% No
